Did you notice that in today's Gospel story the man is not brought to Jesus? I don't know about you, but in my understanding, it takes two to commit adultery. Yet, only the woman is brought. The Law in both Leviticus and Deuter-

onomy decreed that both adulterer and adulteress be put to death. Apparently, the man managed to get away!

In the Gospel story, the woman is not condemned, but she is cautioned by Jesus to sin no more. She doesn't "get away" with her sin, but she is forgiven.

Vengefulness may tempt us to act more like the religious leaders in today's Gospel than like Jesus when we are confronted with another's sin. But what happens when we are confronted with our own?



The history of the St. Joseph "Altar": Dried wheat stalks cracked beneath their feet; farmers faced a life-threatening drought. Famine set in. They pleaded to St. Joseph who brought relief with life-giving rain. An altar was set up in

thanksgiving and for petitions. Many graces and favors were received through St. Joseph's intercession. The altar became known as the St. Joseph table. The table was set with ornate and elaborate displays of breads, vegetables and fruit. The "Table" serves as a reminder that those who have enjoyed some measure of good fortune must share it with those who have less.

The St. Joseph Celebration was a smashing success. Community building brought many together. Kudos to the Seckingtons, Stassis, Olga K., Betty, the cooks, bakers, seamstresses, basket makers, decorators, Knights and all of you who gave so generously of your time and talent for the benefit of St. Athanasius. It appears we will be a little short of \$3,000 for them. A donation will also go to St. Joseph School to help with a new sound system for the hall. This past Friday evening the Catechumens had the presentation of the "Lord's Prayer" with emphasis on "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us". How fitting that this Sunday's Gospel is about the adulterous woman about to be stoned. Jesus says, "He who is without sin among you, let him throw the first stone at her."

He will not baptize and confirm everyone in the parishes of the diocese, but he will be symbolically present in the chrism which the priests and deacons will use. In recent years, this Mass has also acknowledged the ministry of priests. It invites priests to renew their commitment of service and to receive the prayers and support of the people. The Mass of Chrism gathers the faithful of the diocese at their mother church with their shepherd to prepare for celebrations of Christ in all our churches throughout the year.

Scripture focus - A woman accused of adultery is dragged before Jesus. She is not condemned for prostitution or promiscuity, but the relational sin of adultery, a violation against marriage and social stability. We know little of her story, nor is Jesus told anything of the circumstances surrounding her transgression. He asks for no explanation. Rather, he notes her humiliation, surrounded by self-righteous men who disregard their own sinfulness.

Jesus is handed the heavy burden of judgment. He is caught between the law which is meant to <u>protect the sanctity of marriage</u> and the vulnerability of the woman who stands before him. He knows the intention of entrapment by those who drag her there. It seems an impossible situation.

Jesus chose mercy as his solution to judgment. Our sins are all around us. Others see what we do not. The challenge is to remain mindful of our own vulnerabilities and, thus, arrest our tendencies to reduce another. We are to judge actions, not persons, as good or evil. Through thoughtful awareness of our own inclination to sin, we discover that we share the same humanness of the ones we judge. If we cultivate compassion and forgiveness toward ourselves, are we not less likely to pick up that stone and throw it?

Life Focus - * Imagine this scene happening in your life. Who are you in this picture? How is Jesus guiding you toward forgiveness and compassion? * Considering our tendency to judge, when do you get hooked into throwing stones? * Are there persons within our community who have been isolated through judgment? * What do you do to keep from judging others as less than yourself? * Tell about a time when your fist impression of someone was wrong.
