### From the Deacon's Desk:

There's a true story of a rural doctor in Oklahoma who made house calls. He discovered that he was terminally ill. His children were small, so he decided to tape things that he wanted to tell them. One tape dealt with practic-

ing medicine. He said, "Are you willing to get out of a warm bed on a cold night and drive 20 miles to see a sick person, knowing that they can't pay you and that they could wait until morning to be treated? If you can answer yes to that question, you are ready to study medicine." In today's Gospel, Jesus said, "The Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve." Could we answer "yes" to the doctor's question? Could we do this for a friend? Are we ready to follow Jesus? Even in small ways?

PROJECT ACHIEVE is being served by three "teams" from St. Joseph. We serve only on the fourth Monday of the month. Is it possible that we might be able to take another night? Maybe a Wednesday? Maybe a weekend night? As mentioned at the Parish Town Hall meeting, Project Achieve has been successful in placing 120 men and women, once homeless, into permanent housing. Is your "Catholic" showing?

October 29 is the fifth Sunday of the month. That is St. Joseph's day to feed the homeless "under the bridges." We ask your prayers that we may bring the Word of God to touch them and let them know they are not forgotten.

This Sunday's Gospel is about service. How many slogans in businesses do you know that say, "Our business is to serve you" in one form or another? John Paul II's papal motto was "servant of the servants." The Prime Minister of Great Britain is known as the "First Servant." Public servants come in all shapes ands sizes: waitresses, bank tellers, nurses, doctors, police, firemen and women and sales people. We are a service oriented society. Now we need to turn it up a notch. As Jack Lemmon once said, "When you have done well in life, it is time to send the elevator back down."

OUR PRAYER: Lord our God, Father of all, You guard us under the shadow of Your wings. You are the source of power and inspiration; give us strength and joy in serving You through our brothers and sisters in need. Amen.

### **Quote from Tradition**

The Lord says, "those who seek the first place harm and disgrace themselves most, for they are among the last things with us are not like things outside. For the rulers of the Gentiles lord it over them, but with me, the last is first. As proof that I do not say these things without cause, look at the things which I do and suffer - and I have done something even greater. For, though King of the powers above, I was willing to become man, and I submitted to be despised, and treated shamefully. And I was not satisfied even with this, but I came to my death." Therefore he says, "The Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many. For I even gave my life as a ransom, and for whom? For my enemies. If you are abused, it is on your own account; but I am abused for your sake." Do not be afraid, then, as though your honor were degraded. For however much you humble yourself, you cannot descend as much as your Lord. And yet his descent has become the ascent of all, and has made his own glory shine forth. For before he was made man, he was known only among the angels; but after he was made man and was crucified, far from lessening that glory, he acquired even more. Do not fear, then, as though your honor were diminished, if you should abase yourself, for in this way your glory is exalted and becomes greater. This is the door of the kingdom. So let us not go the opposite way, nor war against ourselves. For if we desire to appear great, we shall not be great, but the most dishonored of all.

### Dear Fellow Parishioners of Middle-Schoolers,

I've been involved with religious education for about 9 years now, but have never had a child old enough to attend Middle School Rel. Ed. Classes here at our parish. I wanted to share a story about our family's experience. It may be similar to those you might be having.

Scripture Focus: Today Jesus predicts his suffering, reiection & resurrection for the third time. The pattern is always the same: Jesus predicts his suffering; the disciples fail to understand; Jesus then teaches clearly about himself & about what following him means. In his third prediction of suffering, Jesus describes how he will be handed over to his own people's religious leaders and to the Gentiles and will be spit upon and mocked. James and John, Jesus' inner circle of followers, get caught on the glory promised. They argue for first place. But Jesus points out to them that true greatness is serving the real needs of others - not what the masses of people or the ones in power want. Jesus is that obedient servant of God. Life Focus: \* Speak of a time when you took the rap for someone else or when someone took the rap for you. \* When has suffering in your life caused you to see things differently? \* Describe an experience when you were required to do something you didn't want to do.


