3RD ORDINARY SUNDAY GOD'S LIVING WORD IN THE BIBLE





From the Deacon's Desk:

The Bible, as you are aware, is unsurpassed in publication. You can talk about the "best seller list" but the Bible is par excellence. Did you know that before Jesus' time, the Bible was known only as the "Torah"? Torah means Law.

With the Christin interpretation added, i.e. the New Testament, it became known as the Bible. This is taken from the Greek "Biblos", the inner bark of the papyrus, paper book, hence, the Book. (This excerpt was taken from the St. Joseph Sunday Missal.)

The first reading from Nehemiah (8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10) deals with the end of the Babylonian exile and the reestablishment of worship in the repopulated city. The word is read AND explained and then the congregation gives its assent by "Amen". This is the precursor to the Gospel, Jesus reading in the synagogue. BUT an interesting item to consider is that Jesus took time to worship. So He not only healed and cured and also expelled demons but gave his stamp of approval for us to worship. He too sat down, read and explained scripture.

Now you are wondering what this deacon has up his sleeve, huh? It's a special invite to each of you to join a Small Church Community (aka Small Faith Community) where we read and break open the Word and apply it to our lives and ask ourselves, "So what!?! How is this going to change, encourage or make me live out the Gospel this week?" Call Tina and me and we will help you get started. Next month Lent starts, what a perfect time to begin. "Where two or three are gathered in My name....."

Invitation to Reflect - Today's gospel is the wonderful account of Jesus' ministerial debut in Nazareth, his hometown. He chooses for his first sermon the beautiful text from Isaiah which speaks of a heavenly transformation of the earth, a prophetic prediction of a world where liberty is brought to captives and recovery of sight is given to those who cannot see. The Spirit of God empowers him to speak prophetically and authoritatively.

Luke is writing for a Gentile Christian community. Whereas the Hebrew Christians were familiar with the prophetic tradition of Isaiah, the Gentiles were not privy to this in their background. This citation of Isaiah was a radical new concept to their religious sensibilities. Luke tells us how he systematically compiled data to be included in a gospel version that was pertinent to his non-Hebraic listeners. He documents his narrative sources and, then, stretches his audience with the social ramifications of Jesus' call.

We are equally stretched by the prophetic images to which Jesus refers. He takes a messianic text and reveals his identity through it. He speaks of fulfillment in a world where inequities still exist. <u>What challenge does this place upon us as we live our</u> <u>lives as family members and individuals within a larger society?</u>

In our time, we must grapple with continuing the implementation of Jesus' mandate. Let us visit the text again and derive a contemporary meaning for ourselves. <u>As followers, we are challenged</u> to promote the legacy of anointing the world, <u>bringing</u> glad tidings to those who are impoverished in body, mind, spirit, or social consequence. Like the Gentile believers, we must take up afresh the message so that Jesus' proclamation is **realized** by those who live in our day. Then, we too can boldly announce that, "Today this scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing" (4:21).

Life Focus - * How do I participate in bringing "glad tidings to the poor" and proclaiming "liberty to captives"? * How am I (or we as a group) being stretched in understanding Christ's mandate to help in the recovery of sight to the blind and the release of prisoners, that is, those who are in need? * How could we as a group proceed to respond more wholeheartedly to realize the fulfillment of these instructions?
