From the Pastor's Desk:

I. Today's Gospel story, the Good Samaritan, is one of the most beloved. It is also one of those most of us know by heart. Without a moment's hesitation we could launch into the retelling of this narrative. The concept of helping an

unknown person has even entered into our legal parlance with the enactment of so-called "Good Samaritan" laws designed to protect those who aid others in good faith.

It might be good for us to look at this story from the other side for once. Recall that the Samaritans were despised by the Jews of Jesus' day. They were foreigners and outsiders. And yet one of "them" provided care for the man who fell in with robbers. Who are the many unknown (and maybe undesirable) who provide all types of care for us? In what ways are we the beneficiaries of countless good "Samaritans?"

II. The Catholic Church teaches us that we as Catholics are to vote for politicians who will be concerned for justice and the common good. This includes the least of our brothers and sisters. Jesus tells us that what we do for the least of our brothers and sisters we do to him. (Mt. 25:31-46) The we includes our politicians. This teaching is not politics but Catholic Social Justice, Catholic Moral Theology. The Church tells us for what (policies) to vote not for whom to vote (politics). We must decide for ourselves which politicians best fulfill Catholic Moral Theology. Such is the case in Cardinal Mahony's June 29th statement regarding the failure of the Senate to pass a Comprehensive Immigration Reform Bill. This statement is posted in the narthex (vestibule).

This Sunday's readings are about the "Law of Love." Moses tells his people that the Law is already in their hearts. Jesus sums up the Law in two commands: "love of God and love of neighbor." In the Good Samaritan parable we

may miss the point that Jews and Samaritans felt about as much warmth toward each other in Jesus' time as Jews and Palestinians do in our times.

Bringing it closer to home: what would you feel if we changed the words around a little? That is, what would we feel if it were an immigrant who was beaten and left for dead? What would our feelings be then? What about the 12 that were found dead in the Arizona desert these past few months? They had it coming to them? What about their families that were relying on them to earn a "living wage" so they could keep their families alive back home. be it El Salvador, Guatemala, Mexico or South America? Our Prayer: We pray this week especially for people who have injured us or done something to earn our dislike. We also stand before our God with people who differ from us in race or religion, and with politicians on both sides of the aisle. We ask a helping hand for people who bear the burden of the world's wars, for all who go to bed hungry every night and for other people who, like us, suffer in lonely isolation.

Scripture Focus - In today's Gospel two questions are addressed to Jesus by a legal expert and Jesus answers both by posing a further question. The answer to the second question takes a bit more time. Jesus tells a shocking story. The story is shocking because the Samaritans, who were descended from Jews who had intermarried with pagans, were hated by Jews. So, the good Samaritan looks after someone who despises him. After the story, Jesus poses a counter-question, which really changes the original question from "Who is my neighbor?" to "What is involved in my being a neighbor?" The reluctant answer is "The one who treated him with compassion." And Jesus says, "Then go and do the same."

Life Focus - * In the parable of the Good Samaritan, which of the four characters do you identify with? Explain. * Speak of a time when you felt second best or excluded. Who was or was not a Good Samaritan to you? * Who are the people in this world who couldn't teach you a thing? * Tell of a time you were a good neighbor to a stranger. * Describe an occasion when you did *not* help a person who needed you. * When has a person you least expected shown you the way? * Who or when do you find it easy to pass by? Why?
