#### From the Desk of Fr. Jim:

Sometimes there can be a tendency for us to measure and judge others according to our own set of standards and values. The way we think and feel are often ways that are used as a yard-stick to measure and evaluate others.

In other words, other people are good or right or acceptable only to the extent that they adhere to our way of thinking and our way of acting. Unfortunately this kind of thinking has the ability to promote things like discrimination, individualism and nationalism that is prevalent in the world today.

Superiority over others can be so insidious that it can reach right into the Church, in spite of the fact that Scripture condemns it, wherever it is, as sinful.

The Jews of Jesus' time thought that they were better off and more acceptable to God than the Gentiles. Catholics can think that they are better off and more acceptable to God than Protestants. And Christians in general can think that they are better off and more acceptable to God than non-Christians.

Yet, Scripture tells us the direct opposite; it tells us that God's love and concern is not restricted or more easily accessible to one group over another, but rather that salvation is equally and impartially there for all.

In the gospel, Jesus says: And people will come from the east and the west and from the north and the south and will recline at table in the kingdom of God. But Jesus also warns us that salvation is like coming through a narrow gate. This doesn't mean that only a few will be saved; but what it does say is that while salvation is indeed open to all, the door isn't automatically open to anyone. Not to Jews because they are Jews, not to Christians because they are Christians, but rather the door is freely opened only by Jesus. And he opens it to all who respond to God's love and grace.

People are called to seek God in any one of the different religious and spiritual ways in which they find themselves in their own specific historical circumstances.

My hope and prayer for each of us is that as we continue our journey toward that narrow gate, that we journey in the sure hope of an all loving God who is always present to us and who will guide us on our journey.

#### **Small Church Community**

Scripture Focus: Luke, the Gentile, is very interested in God's all-embracing love, a love not limited to certain ethnic or religious groups. In the Gospel Jesus is on his way to Jerusalem. Those with him want to know if those who will be saved are few in number. Jesus was not about to set limits on God's saving power. They are to know that God's generosity must be matched by generosity on their part. Gong through "a narrow door" is difficult; one has to work at it. It isn't like slipping through a wide, open passageway in the midst of a large crowd. There is to be a personal, practical response to God's invitation.

**Life Focus:** \* In order to make it through the narrow door, what changes do you need to make in your life that you have been putting off? \* Name a time when you took the easy way out, instead of doing the better course of action.

# **Catechetical Corner**

Have you ever been at Mass and wondered why a certain color vestment is being worn? Or why the altar is decorated in green, white, red, or purple?



This is not a random choice but is a system to create uniformity, structure, and movement through the liturgical calendar.

Liturgies celebrated during the different seasons of the liturgical year have distinctive music and specific readings, prayers, and rituals. All of these elements work together to reflect the spirit of the particular season. The colors of the vestments that the priest wears during the liturgy also help express the character of the mysteries being celebrated.

These colors may also be used in linens and cloths that cover the altar and ambo. Color communicates emotional and spiritual realities to the worshipping community. Liturgical color is more than decorative; it also helps to express the shifting mood of the assembly gathered together to worship. Liturgical color helps to symbolize the deeper realities we celebrate and help us to worship in the spirit of the season.

White (the color of joy and victory) is a festive color and is used for the seasons of Easter and Christmas. It is also used for the feasts of Our Lord, Mary, All Saints, Chair of Peter, Conversion of Paul, the Nativity of John the Baptist, St. John the Evangelist, the angels, and for saints who are not martyrs. It is also a reminder of the resurrection and can therefore be used at funerals; purple or black may also be used. Gold may also be used on solemn occasions.

**Red** (the color of fire and blood) is used on the days when we celebrate the passion of Jesus, Passion (Palm) Sunday and Good Friday. It is also used for the birth feasts of the apostles and evangelists and for the celebrations of martyrs. Red (the color of fire) recalls the Holy Spirit and is used on Pentecost and for the sacrament of Confirmation.

**Green** (the color of plants and trees) symbolizes life, anticipation, and hope and is used during Ordinary Time. Ordinary does not mean ordinary in the sense of routine or basic. Ordinary means the weeks/months between the special seasons (i.e. Christmas, Lent, Advent and Easter), as in the 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time. It's different from a regular calendar, but not included in the special seasons.

**Violet** or **purple** in Advent helps us to remember that we are preparing for the coming of Christ. Lent, the season of penance, repentance, and renewal, also uses the colors violet or purple.

**Rose** is an optional color that is used only two days a year, the Third Sunday of Advent, and on the Fourth Sunday of Lent. It expresses the joy of anticipation for Christmas and Easter.

#### From Deacon Don's Desk:



The Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary last week left lessons for us in **Faith**, **Action** and **Trust**. Faith is confidence in God that He has a better plan than what we may have for ourselves. Action is the second
