From the Desk of Fr. Jim:

In today's Gospel reading Jesus tells his disciples "whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple." This doesn't seem like the greatest of invitations. I mean, how many of us want to carry a cross like

Jesus did? It is a journey of sacrifice and suffering. Sometimes we have a hard time conceiving of how God wants to fulfill our deepest desires, and we may just have to be open to the fact that maybe the way of the cross is not a way to endless suffering but the way to endless joy.

The problem is, if we cannot "know God's counsel," as the Book of Wisdom tells us today then how can we experience the infinite joy that God offers?

Maybe we need to use our imaginations so that we will be satisfied with nothing less than infinite joy. Why settle for mere success and financial security when the redemption of the cross is offered to us?

Jesus calls us to dream big - to dare to imagine that we can follow him and find a happiness that transcends all pain and suffering. If we follow Jesus, and even if we don't, we will still experience hardship and difficulty. The good news of the Gospel is that we will carry heavy burdens and heavy hearts much easier if we dare to love others as Christ loves us.

Scripture Focus: The readings for Sunday deal with leprosy. In biblical times there was one way to control the disease: isolate the person with leprosy from all aspects of society. Those with leprosy were cut off from everything: family, friends, employment and worship. No one would dare to approach them and they dared approach no one. Both readings use this dreaded disease to point up the power of God to work wonders through ordinary means. Only one of the men cured by Jesus had the decency to go back & thank him. Only one of them fully realized what had taken place. His is the complete healing, his is the deepest faith. This man, a Samaritan, was an outcast due to both his leprosy & his ethnic background. Luke uses this story to point out the ingratitude of Jesus' own people in contrast to the gratitude & faith of Gentiles. Life Focus: * How do you best show your gratitude to God? To others? * Share a time when you were aware that you did not show gratitude to God or to others. * What are the "leprosies" in your life that need to be healed? Zero in on one in particular. * Recall an experience of being accepted when you were feeling rejected. * Relate an experience when you felt like a stranger and someone welcomed you. * Speak of a person you know who is truly grateful.

A Jesuit posed the question, "How creatively do you try to champion the cause of the needy in our midst?" The mayor presided at court and an unemployed man accused of stealing bread for his family was brought before him. The mayor said, "Sir, I'm sorry! The law excuses no one. I sentence you to a \$10 fine." He then levied a 50 cent fine on everyone in the courtroom for living in a city where a person has to steal to feed his family. The man walked out of the courtroom with tears in his eyes and \$47.50 in his pocket. Question rephrased: How do our lives have a positive effect on the poor?

Proverbs 19:17 When you give to the poor, it is like lending to the Lord.

Our Prayer: Lord Jesus, let me realize that the rosary is nothing more than a meditation on Your Holy Mysteries in company with Your mother. Help us to recite the Rosary daily, if possible. Amen.
