It doesn't make any difference how harsh or mild the winter has been, every year we look forward to the springtime. The new season promises us a change in temperatures, new leaves and colorful flowers, more time outdoors, and we generally

find people in a better mood. Just the thought of spring can bring a smile to our faces. It is with hope that we welcome the new season because it gives us a new perspective on life, and it promises us better months ahead.

A new perspective and a new future is also what Jesus offers us. In a world where we can be quick to condemn others Jesus asks us to forgive; and in a world where the marginalized are at times disregarded, Christ asks us to embrace them.

In a society where at times people seek vengeance, we are told to call for justice. In a culture where lies sometimes seem to get people ahead. Christ calls us to proclaim the truth. In a culture where hate is acceptable, we are invited to love. And in a world where sin can be seen as appealing, Jesus offers us grace. A universe that reflects Jesus' vision is the reign of God that is already here in our midst. And we are reminded that he brought his vision into the world by his life, death, and resurrection, a vision he wants to share with each of us.

Our lives, as disciples of Jesus, should strive to reflect the Reign of God. It is something that must begin in our own hearts. Lent invites us to look honestly and lovingly into ourselves, and to recognize all the goodness and all the sinfulness that is there. None of us have a perfect heart. But Jesus who is the greatest expression of God's love sees beyond that, and He offers us forgiveness and invites us to start anew. The springtime of the Resurrection awaits us. We need to be prepared to welcome it and celebrate it with a clean heart, and a renewed commitment to build up the Kingdom of God.

Jesus called out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" He came out. John 11:13-14 Robert Ingersoll, a 19th century agnostic, suggested to an audience of believers that Jesus'

words, "Lazarus, come out!" were simply a prearranged cue to have Lazarus (who feigned death) strut forth gloriously from the tomb. Emphasizing his point. Ingersoll said, "Why did Jesus say, '*Lazarus*, come out!' Why didn't he just say, 'Come out!'" A man in the audience shouted, "Because if my Master had said that, every person in that there cemetery would have come out!"

Hidden or not, the Ingersoll story clarifies the point of the Lazarus story: All the faithful will rise someday.

Catechetical Corner

As most of you know, beginning this year on the First Sunday of Advent, we will begin using the New Roman Missal.



Below is the new version of the Gloria that will come into use. The current Gloria is also there for your comparison. This is the first one of these changes that I want to highlight for you in this Catechetical Corner column. Since the Gloria is most often sung, it becomes not only a matter of learning the new words but also these new words are being put together with new music as well. We have a lot of learning to do, but we'll learn it together. I would suggest that you keep this bulletin article and read it several times and also read it out loud. Feel free to read it with your families as well. I think this will help all of us as we implement these new translations.

Current Gloria

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace to people of good will. We praise you, we bless you, we adore you, we glorify you, we give you thanks for your great glory, Lord God, heavenly King, O God, almighty Father. Small Church Community

Scripture Focus: Today's readings marvel at the creative, life-giving power of God. Ezekiel tells us that the God who can transform lifeless bones into vital human beings can restore a nation from the death of exile to a life of freedom. Paul tells the Romans that the power of the Spirit brings our mortal bodies to life through the creative, transforming presence of the Spirit of God dwelling in us. In the Gospel we see a marvelously dramatic example of the power of God to bring life out of death. The essential message for us is Jesus' pronouncement: "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die" (John 11:25).

Life Focus: * Relate a time when you made a decision because of friendship. What were the consequences? Did it mean going along with the crowd or with Christ?

* Describe an instance when you denied yourself some extravagant want. How did the denial increase your faith? * Imagine some of the emotions and feelings that Lazarus might have experienced on "the first day of the rest of his life." Describe a time when you experienced some of those feelings in your life. Did it change you? * Have you been able to allow God to open any of the graves you dug yourself and heal you? * What are the small "resurrecttions" that keep you conscious of God in your life?
