From the Desk of Fr. Jim:

The poet Maya Angelou was once asked what her lifetime goals were. She answered that she wanted to become a Christian. Maya Angelou is Christian. Her point is that Christianity is an ongoing process of becoming. Everyday we take steps to becoming a Christian.

Today's Gospel revolves around the question: "Which commandment of the Law is the greatest?" Another way to put this question is to ask, "What do I need to do to be a good Christian?" It seems like a reasonable question.

Loving God and loving our neighbor sum up the law and the prophets. It is the fabric of our lives. It is that which makes us who we are. Loving God and loving our neighbor is at the heart of our daily lives, the basis of our decisions, the reason for our prayer life, the motivation of our lifestyle and the very reason why we are here every week.

We pray today that we might love God with our whole heart, our whole mind and whole soul, knowing that then we will have the answer to the question, "What do I need to do to be a good Christian?"

They then form teams consisting of defense, prosecution, witnesses, court bailiff, journalist and artist. They compete twice during the initial process with presenting their defense at one of those times and the other their prosecution. The "trials" are presided over by real judges and take place at the Los Angeles County Courthouse downtown. Last year, St. Joseph School Mock Trial Team made it all the way to the quarter finals. Catechetical Corner

What opportunities does the new *Missal* offer the Church? Implementing the new *Missal* will give the Church an oppor-



tunity to take a fresh look at its liturgical practice and to renew its celebration of the Sacred Liturgy, which is the "source and summit" of Christian life (Second Vatican Council, *Dogmatic Constitution on the Church* [Lumen Gentium], no. 11). The faithful, encountering the Liturgy anew in the new text, can deepen their sharing in Christ's sacrifice, offering their lives to the Father as they worship "in Spirit and truth" (Jn 4:23).

Small Church Community

Scripture Focus: Sometimes we hear people speak of the God of the Old Testament as a harsh judge, while the God of the New Testament is a loving and compassionate God. But there is only one God. Today's first reading from the Book of Exodus deals with the Ten Commandments and some specific ways they are to be lived and understood. These commandments are not burdensome and oppressive. In fact, they are essential if humankind is to live a free civilized life. They will ensure our happiness. In the Gospel. Jesus' enemies try once again to trip him up. They think he will speak against the Law of Moses. But Jesus agrees that the greatest commandment is to love God with one's whole being, with one's heart and mind and soul. The second commandment, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself," follows from and completes the first. This twofold command sums up the Law of Moses and the teachings of all the Hebrew prophets. Life Focus: * How was it tough to love someone this week? * From your personal experience, what keeps you from loving God, your neighbor or yourself? Of the three, which for you is the hardest to love? * How have you shown concern for another in a simple way this week? * What/who helps you stay centered on what really counts in life?
