

Scripture Focus: In today's Gospel Jesus comes right out and accuses scribes and Pharisees, the religious leaders, of being false. Some Pharisees, who were supposed to be role models for the people, taught one thing but lived in another way. Jesus told the disciples to respect the Pharisees' positions as successors of Moses and to take their teachings seriously. But the disciples were not to follow the Pharisees' example. Jesus makes it clear to his followers that they must honor and respect God instead of being overly concerned about their own importance and power. They were called to serve others, not be applauded by them.

Life Focus: * Are you aware of any instances in your life when the image you presented to others was not borne out by your actions? How did you feel? What did you learn? What caused you to become aware that you were untrue? What change happened?

* Describe a time when you felt you were better than another person and refused to relate with them in any way (poor neighborhood, less money, a church with minorities, ethnic or lower social positions).

* Give an example of a leader you know who doesn't have to be important in everyone's eyes but tries to be of service to others.

* Describe a time when someone did something special for you without letting you know who it was.

* Relate an experience when you felt too proud to be with a person who might embarrass you, or when you didn't want to do a job you considered beneath you.




EUCHARISTIC ADORATION Thursday, November 3, 6-8 pm

From Deacon Don's desk: October is Respect Life Month. This month we have had Pennies From Heaven, Crop Hunger Walk, Feed-A-Baby, and it's the month of the Holy Rosary. This month's memo on the Catholic calendar by Catholic Extension says they have, in the past six years, contributed over \$100 million to struggling American parishes and some campus ministries. Now is not the time to be complacent though. Fr. Ken Roberts wrote concerning "Pro Choice," "Don't be misled; what they mean is Pro-Murder." He goes on to say, "A most powerful witness to give is the power of prayer in a group gathered to pray for the unborn and the mother who contemplates to terminate her baby. We have a beautiful prayer from scripture: Hail Mary. Blessed is the fruit of every womb that carries an unborn child, because God has breathed life into it."

On 60 Minutes, at the tail end of the interview with Isaacson, author of Steve Jobs' biography, he was asked about Jobs' thoughts on the afterlife. He quotes Steve, "Sometimes I believe in God. I've been thinking about it. Since my cancer I've been thinking about it more, and I find myself believing a bit more. Maybe it's because I want to believe in an afterlife." There is hope for him.

November 2 is All Souls Day. Come to the cemetery for the 10 a.m. Mass. The presider will be Archbishop Jose Gomez. What more fitting place to pray for all souls, the earthquake victims in Turkey and those who suffer due to our economic conditions.
