From the Desk of Fr. Jim:

The image of the king in Jewish thought was of a man who was chosen by God as a leader and a lawgiver, and he was called to faithfulness to the Lord. But men like Herod had perverted the image of kingship by the time of Jesus into an unquenchable quest for power and riches.

That is why the scriptures tell us that Jesus strongly rejects any attempt to make him a king. Yet, Jesus presents the true picture of a king faithful to God's purpose: He said, "For this I was born, for this I came into the world, to bear witness to the truth." It is in this light of a humble merciful king and judge that we should read today's Gospel as a message of hope for the humble.

I challenge each one of us here today to focus on the truth about life and to be aware of the request of Christ that in our daily life we are asked to recognize Him. I leave each of us with a question to answer. Is our commitment to the kingdom of this world or to the King who said, "My kingdom is not of this world"? My hope and prayer for each of us is that we choose the latter.

Scripture Focus: Today's description of the last judgment goes further than any other. This final judgment determines what counts in the end. It is not success or how perfectly a person had developed. In the end, the judgment is about love for the poorest, the no-accounts, the ones easy to miss. It is not about doing good or chartable things for a cause or out of a sense of duty. What counts is doing real practical good out of genuine love. Jesus tells us that when we do this, we are serving Jesus himself.

Lectors, I know you are miles ahead of me, but I thought it important to note that besides the proper pronunciation of Ezekiel and other words, the footnotes are good points to reflect on, such as this

Sunday's solemnity of "Our Lord Jesus Christ the King." "What had the shepherds (leaders of Israel) done wrong?" They took good care of **themselves** at the expense of the poor people by feeding themselves with the milk and slaughtered fatlings and wore their wool. **But** they failed to take care of the weak, the sick and injured. Ezekiel's last two sentences reflect the Lord's response to the deceptive ones. The Gospel describes the basis on which the King (the Son of Man) will make His judgment. The standard on which the King will judge is similar to our "corporal works of mercy" feed the hungry, clothe the naked, visit the sick and imprisoned, give drink to the thirsty, welcome a stranger and you welcomed me. I recall this important passage, Mt 25:35, the way Blessed Teresa of Calcutta expressed it, by calling it the "five-fingered gospel," that by raising her hand she said, "You did it to Me." Note she did not say, "You did it for Me" as in the Gospel, but she recognized Jesus in the poorest of the poor. Lectors, my prayer is that you will reflect on the
