

From the Pastor's desk:

In today's Gospel reading, Jesus heals ten lepers and only one of them, a Samaritan, comes back to give thanks to God for his healing. If you're like me, sometimes we're not very good at giving credit where credit is due.

At times we can behave like the nine lepers who were healed but neglected to thank God for their recovery. Like them, we can be very quick to come to Jesus with our problems, but we are much slower to come to God in prayer when there is no longer a crisis.

The Gospel calls us to a lifestyle of thankfulness. We are called to acknowledge that God is the source of all that is good in our lives. To think otherwise is to believe that we somehow earn our good fortune as payment for superior service to God. Thankfully, the kingdom of heaven does not operate on a merit system.

I encourage all of us to remember and acknowledge that we do not manufacture our happiness and success by our own will power, but we receive it as a totally free gift from the God who loves us unconditionally. And when we can do that, then I think we truly are giving credit where credit is due for all that is good in our lives and our world.

YEAR OF FAITH

Year of Faith - October opens with "Respect Life Sunday," and, in this Year of Faith, Jesus' disciples pray in our name: "Increase our faith." How comforting is Jesus' response. Faith cannot be measured by quantity but by quality—faith's willingness

to trust, risk, dare—and when we see a need, to act on it. Jesus saw ten lepers and healed them; the Samaritan saw that he was healed and gave thanks, faith transforming his healing into salvation. If God sometimes seems slow to act, like the judge in Jesus' story, could God be inviting us, who experience Jesus' self-sacrificing love in the Eucharist, to make God's work of love and justice our own? October's final Sunday prepares us for the Year of Faith's final month with Jesus' parable of the Pharisee and tax-collector. Though everyone presumed the Pharisee to be faith personified, he was not praying to God at all, just talking to himself. He replaced the praise of God with a litany of self-congratulation, and intercession with judging his neighbor. As the Year of Faith draws to a close, Jesus asks each of us, which of these two are you?

From Deacon Don's desk:



October is the "month of the Holy Rosary." Oct 7 is the memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary. There's a fascinating story of the power of the Holy Rosary in the Battle of Lepanto, a naval victory won by the Christian fleet that was inferior to the enemy.

Through the help of the Mother of God whose aid was invoked through praying of the rosary, a legendary battle was won. St. Bernard, abbot, each day would walk past a statue of the Blessed Mother and say, "Hail Mary!" Then one day Mary responded with "Hail Bernard!" Never think that your prayers go unanswered. St. Bernard wrote, "The Word was made flesh and dwells among us." He goes on to say, "It is by faith that He dwells in our hearts, in our memory, our intellect and penetrates even our imagination. What concept could man have of God if He did not first fashion an image of Him in his heart?"

St. Margaret Mary Alacoque (Oct 16 feast day) is responsible for spreading the devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. She writes, "from the Divine Heart three streams flow endlessly: First is of mercy for sinners and pours sentiments of contrition and repentance. Next is of charity which helps all in need seeking perfection to find means to overcome difficulties. Third stream flows love and light for benefit of His friends who wish to unite and share His knowledge and devote themselves to advancing His glory." She asks, "Are you making no progress in prayer? Then you only need offer God the prayers which the Savior has poured for us in the Sacrament of the Altar."

St. Louis of Grignion says, "To discover whether people are of God, I have found no better way than the following: observe whether they say the Hail Mary and Rosary."

OUR PRAYER: Lord Jesus, let us realize that the Rosary is nothing more than a meditation on Your Holy Mysteries in company with Your Holy Mother. Help us to recite the Rosary daily. Grant grace through this recitation; impress His love on our hearts. Amen.
