INDOOR MASSES RESUME NEXT WEEKEND!

Dear Parish Family,

Lenten Peace and Greetings to you and your family! Next weekend, March 6-7, we'll resume indoor Masses. We'll start off slow and follow the six pages of safety protocol guidelines published by the Archdiocese, State and County health officials. We're allowed 25% of capacity in the church, so with the liturgical ministers, only 90 parishioners can attend the Mass. Of course, we'll continue to celebrate our Sunday Outdoor Mass. At all indoor and outdoor Masses, all safety protocols will be observed including: masks must be worn and social distancing of six feet will be respected. Commencing next weekend is our new weekend liturgy schedule:

Saturdays at 5:00 PM – Vigil Mass Inside the Church

Sundays at 8:30 AM – Outdoor Mass on the Grass

Sundays at 10:30 AM – Mass inside the Church

(Saturdays at 8:00 AM – Mass recorded for YouTube – public not allowed – Mass is posted online Saturday at 4:00 PM for all of those staying at home).

For the indoor Masses, we need to form several rotating teams to greet parishioners and go through the safety questions, and teams to sanitize the church seating area after Mass. If you plan to attend one of the indoor Masses and can help out please inform our office manager, Brenda Pineda by e-mailing her at <u>brenda@stjosephlb.org</u>

Commencing on Monday, March 8 we will move our morning weekday Mass back into the Church. Weekday Mass is celebrated at 8:00 AM on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday.

We are still dispensed from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass and so for all of you staying at home we'll pray together at our YouTube Mass.

FEBRUARY 28, 2021

Jesus was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white.

Mark 9:2-3

THE BELOVED SON

Today's first reading, known as "the Binding of Isaac," refers to the way Isaac is bound and laid upon the wood of the altar of sacrifice. God directs Abraham to offer his son in sacrifice, killing the beloved son that had been a special gift to him and Sarah in their old age. How could God ask Abraham to do such a thing? Abraham offers no resistance, but in preparing for the sacrifice, Abraham may have agreed with the psalmist that he was "greatly afflicted." Saint Paul's letter to the Romans refers to Jesus as God's beloved Son, which is also how God identifies Jesus to Peter, James, and John at the Transfiguration. Afterward, Jesus tells those disciples not to mention the event to anyone until after his resurrection from the dead. The event, together with Jesus' comments, leaves the disciples thoroughly confused.

HOW COULD GOD ASK ABRAHAM TO DO THAT?

Through the centuries, Christians and Jews alike have found the Binding of Isaac one of the most difficult passages in the Bible. Even though God intervenes to save Isaac, the whole episode strikes some readers as cruel. However, Abraham, the ultimate man of faith, raises no objection, offers no resistance as he simply goes about preparing for the trip and the sacrifice.

Today's other readings might help us see that text differently. In Mark's description of the Transfiguration, Jesus' clothes become white and shining, and Moses and Elijah appear with him. Moses was the great liberator and lawgiver who led the Jews out of bondage in Egypt and into the wilderness, forming them into the people of Israel by giving them the Law he received from God. Elijah was among Israel's greatest prophets, so close to God that, at the end of his life, he was taken up into heaven by a fiery chariot. Together, Moses and Elijah represent the Law and the Prophets, the ultimate authority for the Jews in the conduct of their daily lives.

LOVE AND GENEROSITY

The Law, the Prophets—and Jesus. For Paul, Jesus is someone quite different from the other two. The reading from his letter to the Romans is short, but rich in meaning. When Paul declares that God "did not spare his own Son," and when God praises Abraham "who did not withhold from me your own beloved son," it is the same Greek word for "spare" and "withhold." God's voice at the Transfiguration identifies Jesus as his "beloved Son"—the same way God refers to Isaac as Abraham's beloved son. Ultimately, God spares Isaac but not his own Son, whom he "handed over for us."

Even if we are disturbed that God tested Abraham like this, Paul says we should be overwhelmingly grateful that God did for us what, in the end, he did not require of Abraham. Jesus, God's Son "handed over to us" in love and generosity, is already a sacrificial gift, signifying that God wants to give us "everything else along with him."

Holding adults to high standards

When you start to talk to your children about inappropriate touching and basic sexual abuse prevention safety rules, be mindful that children can easily be confused by even the best of any adult's intentions, which underscores why all adults have a responsibility to adhere to the highest of standards in their relationships with children. Consider that another good reason to be involved in the activities your children participate in is that it allows you to get to know the adults who work regularly with them. That way, if your child brings a confusing scenario to you, you can more easily discuss the circumstances with your child and the adult involved, with the goal of working towards better behaviors. Despite the pandemic, ESTHER Ministry has been working hard to live out our mission to: End Slavery, Trafficking Humans and Effect Rescue

Humanitarian Outreach-This past year presented additional challenges due to COVID-19. Street Outreach organizations needed PPE (masks, hand sanitizers and gloves) and more hygiene kits in addition to clothing, comfort items and food gift cards. With stores closed and unable to get together to assemble Humanitarian Bags, we ordered these items online and used a member's garage as a central distribution point. In the same manner, we provided the Department of Child and Family Services (DCFS) with PPE, hygiene kits and over 250 outfits for CSEC (Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children) girls and boys. In total, we provided over 6000 items of PPE, hygiene kits, clothing and food.

Lenten Observence

Abstinence and Fasting

Abstinence from eating meat is to be observed on all Fridays during Lent. This applies to all persons 14 and older. The law of fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday applies to all persons 18 or older and younger than 59. Fasting means that one full meatless meal per day may be eaten. Two other meatless meals may be taken sufficient to maintain strength, but together they should not equal a full meal. Liquids, including milk and fruit juice, may be taken between meals. If health or ability to work are affected, fasting does not oblige. Private, self-imposed observance of fasting on Lenten weekdays is strongly recommended. Pastors and parents should ensure that children who are not bound by the laws of fasting and abstinence are taught an authentic sense of penance, conversion and reconciliation


